Volunteers celebrate the opening of volunteer dental outreach

Bill Kerr had a fairly simple dream: to provide free dental care to Haliburton County residents who are in need and don't have the financial means to pay themselves.

That dream - which proved to be a big project - is now a reality cost. known as the Haliburton County

Volunteer Dental Outreach.

Kerr, his dream team, community supporters and local dignitaries attended a special open house event at the Haliburton Legion on June 17 to recognize this significant achievement.

"So many people gave their time,

their money, their equipment, their materials ... I really can't spend the podium to give her opinion on where she felt the true inspiration the time it would take to thank everyone," said Kerr in his opening remarks. A poster with a list of all of the donors and volunteers greeted visitors as they entered the legion.

packed legion that although the idea for a free clinic came out of discussions he had with Haliburton hygienist Lisa Stoughton, a higher power had a hand in things.

"I need to first give credit to God," said Kerr. "He [God] kept

putting it on my heart and I kept on coming up with reasons why it wouldn't work. He kept on solving those obstacles and pushed me to move on."

As a dentist who annually makes trips to Honduras to provide dental care to children in need, Kerr came to the realization that there were people in his own community that needed the same support.

"The idea for this started a few years ago when I was treating a child covered under the CINOT (Children In Need of Treatment) program," he said. "Their dentistry Betty Mills.

anything else."

Last November, Kerr began making connections that in turn, resulted in action. The first person he approached before moving full speed ahead was former colleague and Haliburton dentist, Ed Smolen.

"I was worried about where I was going to get the dental chair, equipment and x-ray machine from. I went into Ed's office and I told him that I thought it would be a good idea to set up a free clinic for low-income adults in the community," said Kerr.

Smolen responded positively by telling Kerr to take a look around his basement.

"He said, 'hey, I've got some dental equipment in the basement. I've got a chair, x-ray machine, a dental unit ... whatever you want you can have," Kerr recalled.

The project really got rolling when Kerr received the support of SIRCH Community Services; the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit (HKPR); and Janis Parker, former Dysart et al councillor and owner of Parker Pad & Printing Ltd.

Kerr and the other organizers formed a steering committee, which became responsible for raising funds for the clinic. Gena Robertson, executive director of SIRCH, worked with the committee and her
